## Framework to support social landlords in decision making on service provision during the COVID-19 outbreak

The Social Housing Resilience Group, convened in response to COVID-19, comprising SFHA, Scottish Government, Scottish Housing Regulator, Wheatley Group, Glasgow and West of Scotland Forum of Housing Associations (GWSF), and Association of Local Authority Chief Housing Officers (ALACHO), has developed this framework to support social landlords in local decision making on service provision and which can help facilitate essential travel by those delivering services during the outbreak

Scottish Government and COSLA have issued advice regarding key workers which can be found <u>here</u>. This sets out categories of key workers with respect to what childcare and learning provision is expected to be made available to them during closures of school and early learning and childcare (ELC) settings to deal with the current outbreak. Organisations will wish to consider this guidance as part of their service planning. Local authorities have discretion as to how apply Scottish Government guidance, so the exact definition of a key worker may vary across the diverse range of localities across Scotland.
