### SG Consultation Top Ten Challenges

- An ageing population
- The current spending profile could be hard to sustain
- Brexit
- UK welfare reform
- Mitigating the effects of climate change

- 25% of households in fuel poverty in 2016
- Tackling and preventing homelessness
- More than 1 in 4 children live in poverty
- Fire safety and building standards
- Islands-proofed policies

### Housing's Vision in the NPF Scotland Peforms

#### A WELL-FUNCTIONING HOUSING SYSTEM

1. The housing market should supply highquality homes for living in, not promote the use of houses as a store of wealth. 5.

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- 2. Government policy (e.g. taxes and subsidies) should promote house price stability, to help underpin Scotland's standard of living and productivity.
- 3. Everybody should be able to save for the future (as well as be secure in their home and make significant changes to it) whether they rent or own.
- 4. Housing provision should be informed by whole life economic costs and benefits in the round and help to address inequalities in wealth, health, and education.

### Consensus?

- The nature of housing is fundamentally long term
- Are there areas where agreement is possible and could readily extend between different governments?
- Big tent housing policy commissions but can the Nordic be transplanted here?
- Commitment to evidence and evaluation.



### Forecasting, Uncertainty and Shifting Facts

- The view of things on Jan 1 2007 or on May 1 2015
- Lessons from the policy failure literature
- Evidence and analytical capacity
- Scenarios and upper and lower bound forecasts remain useful
- Recognise housing system complexity as a starting point.
